Update on St John's & the OSH Project by: The President



St. John's at Beachley & The Old School House

It only seems to be a short while since the last AGM to the publication of this 'Beachley Echoes' edition. Sadly there has been very little real progress in the situation as you know it to be. Two factors have had an influence, John Furley has undergone a serious operation and been away in Spain convalescing and I have had a spell of restricted activity with an ulcerated leg. Neither of these factors have totally inactivated progress – just slowed it down, but I can assure you all the work required has been done and continues.

We are now at the stage, after seeking professional advice, of being able to submit a case to Gloucester Land Registry for 'Adverse Possession' of the OSH. I argued for a logical progression, to my mind, initially submitting a case to Register the OSH and then apply for Adverse Possession after Registration. Both John and our solicitor have advised the direct approach of 'in for a penny', therefore we are now preparing the necessary paperwork to be submitted to the Land Registry by the 1st March. It is not, like most things, as straightforward as it seems. We needed to gather a complete 'case history' from the closure date of the College and BOBA taking over the OSH, until today's date. Most of this work is complete, we now progress by approaching those involved during that period to collate the necessary required evidence.

Once submitted, we are completely in the hands of the authorities, none of us will have any say in the time it takes to obtain a result. If any of you have any experience of this type of procedure, you will know it can be a long and drawn out affair, much I think does depends on the reaction of the MOD! The position of St. Johns is very simple – we are now in a position to purchase – if the membership gives the go ahead, BUT as I have stressed before, we need to know the final position on the OSH before committing ourselves. Both projects are indisputably inter-liked.

Now here is something for you all to consider: If you will bear with me I will outline our thinking of the future home for BOBA. First let me stress very clearly, we have absolutely no intention of leading BOBA into the property market – our actions are nothing more than a means to an end. FACT: both buildings will cost a great deal to renovate to the required standard and we wish to achieve this 'WITHOUT' the need for BOBA to 'dig deep' to fund the project. We have evolved an idea to acquire both buildings and at a very low cost; the OSH by adverse possession, and St Johns for £5000.00. St. Johns is not a very saleable prospect, but the OSH could well be! The income from a sale of the OSH could more than cover all the costs involved in the renovation and entirely maintaining St. Johns.

I must firmly stress that it is no more than an idea at this moment, both John and I will continue to work to investigate every possibility until the point where we can present a clear cut case for your consideration.

In my opinion, the final result will be some time away – the more I become acquainted with the speed at which MOD property work, coupled with Land Registry the more I realise it could be a slow process. Despite my past optimism, I now feel it could take a considerable time! However I have no doubts the end result, should well justify the wait, and the means.

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The President's thoughts.

Little has changed since last putting pen to paper for the Echoes - The Old School House and St. Johns Church, still very much ongoing and foremost in my thoughts. We have made considerable progress BUT it is going to be a long drawn out affair to finalise both projects.

Legal matters now are the next step to enable us to gain Adverse Possession of the OSH and in this respect I need any information I can gather on EXACTLY how/when the OSH was handed/given to BOBA, not hearsay but remembered facts. Can you or anyone out there help 'with true facts'?

Army Apprentice Tradesmen.

At the start of the 1939-45 War the Army stopped recruiting boy Apprentice tradesmen. However, in 1942 the practice was recommenced and, as a result, in April of that year approximately two hundred youths between the ages of 14 and 16 years arrived at the Army Technical School, Beachley Camp, near Chepstow. Some were orphans, several were in short trousers, and many had never left home before. The arrival at Chepstow station, after a wartime train



journey [from Paddington in my case] was a traumatic experience on it's own - but worse was to come. Shouting NCO's herded all us new arrivals onto Army lorries and we were then driven off into what seemed the wilds, eventually delivering us to Beachley Camp, the WW1 wooden hutted camp built on a point of land at the confluence of the rivers Severn and the Wye. What a bleak place it was in April - and even bleaker in the following three winters that I spent there. The huts were in the form of a letter H. The two long legs divided to form a total of four rooms, each housing sixteen boys. In the corner of each room was a small separate

room occupied by the room's boy NCO. The connecting building was the toilets and washroom (cold water only for washing and shaving). Each boy had a bed space containing an iron bed, a mattress consisting of three, square, 'biscuits' (as hard as the iron of the bed), three very thin blankets, and a six foot tall metal locker. On the wall behind each bed were hooks on which we subsequently had to hang our webbing equipment in a <u>very</u> regimental fashion.

Having arrived at our new 'home' and been shown our bed space we were then ordered outside and marched to the cookhouse. Unfortunately, being wartime, our train had been late and our meal, consisting of a fried egg and mashed potatoes, was completely cold. Still, the one slice of bread with a scrape of margarine hadn't been spoiled and the accompanying mug of cold milk helped it down. The reason for the meal fiasco was that the Boys who had joined-up before the war were all away on leave, as were most of the cooks. This left a minimum of staff to run the cookhouse.

The next few days were really hectic, medical & dental checks, inoculations, issue of clothing (denim overalls, boots, etc). instructions as to what we could (or must) do and could not (or must not) do. Strict orders were given as to how beds were to be made up. We had to parcel all our civilian clothing up and it was sent home. Then there was the 'square-bashing'. Until we were considered to be sufficiently well trained, we were confined to the camp. This would take some weeks as a very high standard was demanded. Anyway, we couldn't be allowed out in public until we had been fitted out with 'Service Dress', a high collared tunic buttoned right up to the neck, and our peaked caps. This uniform, together with our white blancoed waist belts, marked us out as 'Beachley Boys'.

A short time after our arrival the senior boys (aged 18-19) returned from their leave. We now had boy NCO's in each room to take charge, (known as Apprentice Tradesmen NCO's). This was not just a nominal duty, they were actually responsible for the room and drew up a weekly roster of duties, each boy in the room being allocated certain cleaning duties such as scrubbing the trestle table or benches, cleaning lampshades, polishing the coal-bin, cleaning the toilets and ablutions, etc.

The A/T NCO's duties also included getting us out on parade, properly dressed for parade, meals, duties, etc. In addition to the general duty of cleaning the room each boy was also responsible for his own bed-space, polishing the floor until it gleamed, dusting his locker and every ledge, ridge, shelf, cleaning the window behind his bed, as well as having all his clothing, webbing and kit in perfect order. Kit inspections were a regular feature. Everything had to be laid out on your bed in a very precise order, shirts and PT vests had to be folded exactly nine inches square. Socks were rolled in a particular way and if a hole was found in one, undarned, you could guarantee you were in trouble. Boots had to have thirteen studs on the sole and a complete and serviceable heel plate. If your kit wasn't laid out precisely as ordained (and sometimes even if it was) you would be ordered to lay it out again at six o'clock in the same evening. This generally meant that you would also have to lay it out again at seven o'clock and then perhaps, even again at eight o'clock. After each inspection it was swept into a heap to make sure you didn't just leave it as it was. As fourteen and fifteen year old boys we certainly didn't have a 'cushy' life.

At Reveille we were expected to be out of bed, or get tipped out. We then washed (and in my case shaved) in cold water in a draughty, unheated washroom, raced to prepared bed-space for inspection before falling-in outside to be marched off for breakfast. The A/T NCO would inspect us before marching us to the cookhouse, this included a thorough inspection of ourselves, our drinking mugs and our 'eating irons' (knife, fork & spoon).

Another task for these A/T NCO's was to protect us from being bullied by the senior boys, but in practice this did not work. Frequently a room would be raided, beds tipped over. Sometimes a bit of a beating for some poor unfortunate, or some of us would be rounded up and made to go to the senior boys rooms. There you might have to clean their kit or boots, or carry out their room chores. On occasions you might have to sing or recite while standing with your arms outstretched with a boot in each hand while your unappreciative audience threw boots, gym shoes, etc at you. We didn't however, have to suffer this for too long as the boys in these earlier Groups would graduated to Man Service and were posted out to their Regiments or to the Military College of Science for further training.



42A 'C' Company ~ Early Days

By this time we were into a regular routine – Physical Training, Military Training, Drill, Weapon Training, Fieldcraft, etc. Education and our main purpose, TRADE TRAINING. For the first few months this consisted of standing at a bench with a chunk of metal in a vice and chiselling, filing and scraping it into various shapes which had to be close to given measurements. One Instructor was known as 'Two-Thou', he insisted on a tolerance of only +/- two thousandths of an inch and this had to be achieved using only callipers, a steel rule and the naked eye! Part of the training was theoretical and we also had to do Workshop Drawing (making our own working drawings). Later in our training we did basic vehicle mechanics, blacksmithing, electrical fitting, lathe and milling machining, etc.

Eventually, in the case of myself and the other apprentices destined for the Royal Artillery, we trained in Gun fitting. Time not spent on the above was NOT free time. For a start, unless you were a Boy NCO you could only have ONE pass a week to go out of Camp, and officially this was only to 9.30 pm (the time that the bus from Chepstow arrived at the Camp). I reached the dizzy heights of Boy Corporal, which put me in charge of a Barrack Room and entitled me to a further TWO passes each week. By now I was 16 and had met a lovely young girl aged 15, so I made full use of my three passes. Eventually I was hauled up on Company Orders in front of our Major. I was torn off a strip and told that I shouldn't go out of camp so often and that I should stay in and make sure my Barrack Room was to standard. As my room had won the shield for best room for several weeks, this seemed more than a little unfair. The following morning I paraded outside the Company Office with my two stripes in my hand (instead of sewn on my sleeve) and was immediately put on a charge for being improperly dressed (and lost my rank as corporal).

Boys were allocated to four Companies, generally by trade and Regiment or Corps. Each week one Company was the Duty Company and had to parade each evening to be detailed off for various duties as Passive Air Defence.

These duties were Fire Party, Ladder Party Rescue, Stretcher, etc. We managed to make a farce of the parade on winter evenings. Because of the blackout no lights were permitted and the Sergeant detailing the duties had to read the names out with the aid of a tiny slit of light from a torch. Boys would be quietly moving down the back of the ranks answering two or three names for mates who were away at the NAAFI canteen. His reward would be a cup of tea and a 'wad' from his pals after he escaped the parade.

We developed, getting into trouble, into a fine art, not that trouble was difficult to find. Any misdemeanour could result in an appearance on Company Orders and result in seven days 'confined to barracks' (colloquially known as CB). Those on CB had to report to the Guard Room each morning before the last note of Reveille, late attendance being viewed very seriously. Then in the evening, after our normal days duty there would be the



first of the bugle calls for defaulters. All those on CB would race to the guard room where they were inspected. The lucky few would be selected for various jobs such as cookhouse fatigues where you might be fortunate enough to be on cleaning tables and benches, or scrubbing the floors, or cleaning all the various pots, pans and other equipment. Or you might get the really filthy job of cleaning out the grease traps. Nevertheless there was always the possibility of scrounging extra food on cookhouse duty. Other defaulters would be allocated offices cleaning, or generally cleaning up the camp, cutting the grass, painting, etc. Finally there were the unfortunates who missed out in this gamble. They would be dismissed with orders to return in a certain time, perhaps in PT kit, next time it might be in 'Walking-out dress' and after that Field Service Marching Order, this carried on until Lights-out. Each time they reported a thorough inspection made and any faults resulted in a 'charge', meaning Company Orders the next day and could bring another seven days CB. These inspections were no a formality – every piece of kit was checked, including the back of cap badges and belt buckles. Every item carried on FSMO was turned out and had to be complete as laid down i.e. water bottles had to be filled with fresh water, and woe betide any apprentice with anything other than regulation respirator, anti-dim cream and anti-gas ointment in his respirator case.

Marching back to our barrack rooms from the workshops after a days work we had the pleasure of military marches being played over the camp loud-speakers, accompanied by our Boy NCO's calling out "Left, Right, Left". But we had developed a march where although there was no discernible file out of step nevertheless the rear of the column was on "Right" when the front was on "Left". This generally resulted in ten minutes 'square bashing' before we were dismissed. One hot summer afternoon we had been on an official visit to the swimming pool, which was a short distance out of the camp. As we were being marched back to camp we foolishly played up a bit and the heat must have frazzled tempers. When we got into camp we were ordered to get into our Field Service Marching Order and parade again. When we were on parade we were ordered to put on our respirators and then our gas-capes, a long oil-skin type coverall. After a quarter of an hour's drill in this dress in the hot sun we would have turned the swimming pool water into steam, if we could have only jumped into it then. When this punishment drill ended we had to race to our barrack rooms for a quick wash, then parade for our tea meal. As soon as I finished tea it was back to the room again, into 'walking-out' gear, i.e. Service Dress, then a two mile walk to Sedbury to meet my girl friend. We then spent the evening walking around until it was time for me to

make the two mile trek back to camp. Getting a Pass to go out of camp was only a beginning to an ordeal. On arrival at the Guard Room, to book out, it was very common to undergo a very thorough inspection by the Provost Sergeant, or the Regimental Police. Back of cap badge and belt buckle inspected, chin strap of cap inspected to ensure that the back part of the strap, which couldn't be seen, was polished. Boots were inspected to ensure the requisite number of studs were on the soles. No shoes for us in those days, clothing coupons were needed for them. If anything was found out of place, you were sent back to your room to rectify the 'fault', which meant that you missed the bus into town and thereby you consequently lost about an hour of your pass.

So far I haven't mentioned the handsome remuneration we were paid. This was the enormous sum of 11d (the equivalent of four and a half pence now). On our first four pay parades we were paid 2s (ten pence) that left over being kept, after deductions for Barrack Damages, to pay us before going on leave; a form of compulsory saving. This 2s we spent riotously in the NAAFI, buying soap, toothpaste, blanco, boot polish, brasso and other exotic items, such as char and wads. Of course, after the four weeks things got better – we were paid 2/6d (twelve and a half pence) of our hard earned money. The bus fare into Chepstow was 4d (one and a half pence) it was as well that we were not allowed out of camp at that time.

The outcome of all this was in 1945 very shortly after joining man-service at the age of 18, I married that lovely young 15 year old I met in 1943, who was now an even lovelier 17 year old. We have been together for 61 years now and hope for many, many more.



Opening.

As is the Association's custom, the Annual General Meeting was held in St George's Church, Beachley
Barracks and the meeting commenced shortly after 1500 hours with approximately 80+ members pre
sent. The Chairman opened the meeting by welcoming those in attendance.

Item 1. Apologies.

2. A fair number of apologies had been received prior to the meeting including that of our Secretary, Major D Walker, who was attending the 50th Anniversary of the formation of the Army Air Corps.

Item 2. President's Welcoming Address.

7. Beachley Old Boys' Association ~ The Search for 58B

In The Beginning

Whilst attending the 2002 BOBA Weekend I met up with Alan Haywood, apart from myself the only other 58B member present on that weekend. We both felt that as our group had a larger than normal intake we should make some kind of effort to do better than to have only two at future BOBA weekends. Having taken early retirement I then took it upon myself to trace enough lads to fill at least a row of seats in the Beachley Church. The search began!

The first thing was to get the groups nominal roll from the BOBA Archives. I have to say that John Furley who was a committee member at the time, proved to be very helpful in quickly supplying the details required and a 2000 UK Info Disk (Electoral Roll) to assist in my quest. The Nominal Roll gives you the correct spelling of surname and more importantly all the chaps initials. It also gives you details of if they completed the Apprenticeship or not. No point in looking for those that purchased a discharge or got a Medical Discharge after 6 months. In the initial stages, the disc was invaluable and helped me to quickly trace those with a less common surname.

The search procedure is lengthy, time consuming and costly, you have to have spare time and the will to keep going. It involved searching the UK Info disc for all those with the correct initials to the surname we were looking for, noting the phone number and then ringing them all in sequence. If the individual was found to be ex- directory, I produced a flyer informing the persons of the search and was posted to all the applicable addresses. This was expensive due to the postage and not a very successful method. However, it did produce a couple of "finds". Later in the search the 192.com network was used which costs around £40 for 100 attempts. This again gives telephone numbers and / or addresses.

The final method was by contacting Army Pensions Records and to send them a list of all those not yet found. If the candidate on your list is in receipt of his pension, you get a helpful Civil Servant at Pensions Office to forward your pre-written letter to them. They will not give you any actual contact details.

The search has been going on for 5 years now and I am pleased to say we have traced 128 of the original 157 listed on the Nominal Roll. In addition to the UK there are some in Australia, Thailand, South Africa, Crete, Malta and Germany. Yes, some of those traced were deceased but that's one of the down sides of such a project. The other is "losing" a few that were traced and then sadly die before getting a chance to attend a reunion. We still have a few more to find..

Several things have come out of this project. Apart from keeping me occupied, we now have more chance 58B attending BOBA Weekends than in the past and

many have been reunited with mates they have not seen since passing out of Beachley.

This year is our groups 50th Anniversary year and the plan has gone beyond filling a row of seats in the Beachley Church. As well as some of us attending the 2008 BOBA Weekend, we are holding a never-to-be repeated 58B Reunion Dinner at the Chepstow Hotel on the evening of Saturday 27th September.

This project would not have been quite as successful without the support, enthusiasm and help from many of 58B group for which I am very grateful.

A number of us will and anyone else who can get a further 72 hour pass granted, can count on being made welcome! One side-benefit that may result from all this is the very real possibility, that 58B attendance at future reunions will increase. As others may well be persuaded to join BOBA, I hope so, that's what it's all about.



HQ Maintenance - Purchase of Additional Heaters for Frost Protection of OSH made during year.

Capital Property consists of the following Items: - BOBA Badge Drawings, Display Stands, Golf Trophies, New Standards and minor miscellaneous items.

Previous Investments were Redeemed during July 2007. BOBA has had to re-apply as an "Approved" Investor in accordance with the Requirements of the Money Laundering Regulations. The redeemed sum was re-invested (not quite such good terms as previous but as good as was available at the time) and now consists of Government Stock as follows: -£12886.11 Nominal Stock in 8% Treasury 2013 Running Yield Approx 6% Gross.

If these stocks are held until July 2013, the Government will redeem at £12888.11. Therefore, unless the stock is sold before redemption, the GPF will see a loss of £15000.00 - £12886.11 = £2113.89. However, the potential loss is more than compensated for by the dividend income of £1030.88 per annum.

Balance of Deposit account has been boosted by £9000 transfer from Current Account, Interest rate on Deposit Account has stayed virtually constant overall during the year despite changes in Bank Rate.

Subscriptions: - Steady influx of subscriptions during the year but well down on projected target, Still some debtors and many members still paying by 5 x annual payments of £10 p.a. until 2010 - 2011.

Donations of £150.53 were made during the year. The Benevolent Fund also benefited from donations of £24.00.

Benevolent Grants totalling £125.00 have been made during the year .

Printing & Postage Costs incurred were slightly higher than previous year.

Committee Expenses includes all committee related travelling and general expenses. Slight decrease from previous year. Postage, Telephone & Stationery costs have again been itemised separately for greater clarity. Prudent Management by Committee Members has kept costs under control and to a minimum.

Shop contributed a significant contribution during the year and additional stock has been purchased to replace dwindling quantities of faster moving items and to enhance range. Details will be available on Website.

BOBA Reunion 2007 actually returned a very small surplus this last year. However, now that we have reached a break even point, it is the Committee's intention continue to balance the event financially to avoid pressure on current assets.

Golf Fund has subsidised the 2007 event with the purchase of an additional Trophy.

Insurance costs have risen slightly during 2007 due to BOBA now carrying insurance for both the OSH and St John's. Depending on the outcome of decisions on the future of OSH and St Johns this situation will continue to be reviewed to meet current requirements.

Finally, My Thanks to all those people (and in particular the Committee), who have helped and supported me during my Nine Years tenure as BOBA Treasurer. 11 years ago, I started a new business from scratch and the last 3 years has seen it take off rapidly after a steady build up. Changes have had to be made to accommodate the successful trend which shows only signs of acceleration for the future, and my Work Exit Plan. I consider it is time for me to step down. However, I hope and would like to remain active within BOBA for many years to come. It is a great Organisation and as my Intake approaches its 50th Anniversary, I want to contribute to its continued success.

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BOBA Membership Secretary's Report ~ by: Rocky Evershed – 61B.

Foreword: Over the last 12 months owing to a variety of commitments, I have not always been available to enroll new members immediately, keep the websites updated and answer your emails promptly etc. Although you can't promise anything in life I will endeavor to keep on top of everything this year.

<u>Membership Fees:</u> By the time you receive this newsletter I will be updating membership fees again from the standing orders that come in annually.

Talking about membership fees, in a rough calculation, 2009 is going to be a very sad year for BOBA in that we are going to lose approx 125 members who will have lapsed on paying their membership fees since they were reintroduced in 2006. I hope to try and avoid this exodus, by writing to each member personally with a gentle reminder. If you know of any member who has lapsed please give them a little reminder in a nice subtle way.

<u>New Members</u>: Recruiting new members this year, has been slightly up on last years figures. To date of writing this report, we have had 40 new members enrolled.

I spend quite a bit of time on the Army Apprentices College site, (formerly the Andy Yarrow site), and when I see a name appear on there that isn't a member of BOBA, I send then a special email inviting them to re/join. Which brings me to the point of the word 'Rejoin'?

As the majority of you will by now know life membership was withdrawn from BOBA when the College closed in 1994 and the present day BOBA was reformed. I get a few messages asking "Why should we now have to pay subscriptions, when we are supposed to be Life Members?" AT 51B's PASSING OUT PARADE IN JULY 1954

I remembered an incident on a Passing out Parade long ago when a plush limousine pulled up at the square and assuming that this was the Reviewing Officer we were brought to attention, but out stepped a gentleman in civilian clothes accompanied by a lady; I later found out that the male was Noel Whitcomb a columnist with the Daily Mirror. I recently tried to get details of the event from the Daily Mirror, as I was sure that such a newspaper would have a record; unfortunately they were not forthcoming, but a further conversation with Roger Hart 52A gained more details. He remembered the event as it was the mother of one of their Group, Arthur (Pomp) Longhurst C Coy, who was the guest with whom Roger, as a member of the Corps of Drums, had been photographed for the media. Roger was also able to obtain from the national archives a copy of the article that was published in the Daily Mirror. The original has been reproduced on the next page as a typed copy for clarity.



When Mum and I went on Parade

The circumstance in which met A/T "Pomp" Longhurst were distinctly odd. As a Mirror columnist, I had received a letter from his Mum, wife of a War Department policeman in Woolwich Arsenal, saying:

Dear Noel, We hear a lot about bad Army camps, but my son, Pomp, aged seventeen, has been two and a half years at Beachley Army Apprentice Training School, Chepstow - and enjoyed every minute. I enclose an invitation to their end-of-term Passing Out Parade, I have never been able to attend as I have three young children and the fare would cost too much. But if you could go instead of me, Pomp would be very pleased as he has never had anyone there." I turned it over in my mind and I had a better idea. "Dear Mrs Longhurst," I scribbled. "Sure I'll go. Why don't you come too as my guest?"

She didn't need asking twice: Wearing a white hat bought specially for the occasion, Mum was waiting at Paddington Station with a smile as wide as platform 5. "We call our Arthur 'Pomp' because his father served twenty two years with the 'Pompadours' the Essex regiment" she explained as we travelled on the train. "Pomp will get the surprise of his life when he sees me." And so he did, he nearly passed out too early when he saw the parade of 800 boys leap to attention and the audience stand as his Mum rolled up in a "bloomin' great limousine".

I think they thought it was the Reviewing Officer, General Sir Ouvry L. Roberts GCB, KBC, DSO. However they very soon found out that it was L/Cpl Whitcomb (Ret'd) and guest.

Soon I was chatting with 'Tiny' Baker, Regimental Sergeant-Major of the school. 'Tiny' stands 6ft 5in in his socks and squashes the scales at nearly I9st. He is reputed to have been made of elephant hide and piano wire.

He retires today to a small holding in the hills looking down on the school "So I can still keep my eye on em". This after twenty-two years service! "Before I leave. I'm going to make young 'Pomp Longhurst' an Apprentice Corporal". he told us.

For one horrible moment, I thought Mum was going to kiss him.

"The boys don't do too badly," he said, that being a very considerable understatement. Pomp, who is getting top grade training to be an electrical engineer, told us he had just sat for his first-class education certificate. He gets 40s a week, & has saved £34 this term.

Pomp showed us the school common room, like a big hotel lounge with television. The billiards rooms, gardens and libraries were fine. The playing fields magnificent.

"Even the food is alright". said Pomp. "I'm glad I went in for soldiering"

We watched the prize-giving and the school play, had lunch in the dining hall and tea with the lads. And in the car going home Mrs Longhurst whispered to me: "Do you know, it's the first day in eighteen years, I've been out without the children?"

The Guard Room Bell (Up and down the Chimney)

Memories of the bell on the chimney episode seem to have faded somewhat, consider this. Sometime in the middle of a night, Spring/Summer 1955 I believe, I was woken by someone shaking me and to feel something heavy on my bed. "What do you think?" or words to that effect were uttered, I stretched out and felt the object, unmistakable, no light needed, it was the guardroom bell. Frank Smith (22821326) and Pete Gray left the room as quickly as they had entered, taking the bell with them.

It became clear the following morning that 'Big Mac' was not happy (was he ever?), a search was mounted but the bell was not found. It had been put under one of the upturned (for the summer) coal bunkers in a barrack room. The following morning Big Mac was clearly even more distressed as lashed to the lightning conductor at the top of the workshop's chimney was the bell. The chimney was not a simple chimney on top of one of the workshops, it was a full blown factory chimney but with no outside ladder. To get to the rungs built into the inside one needed to get into the boiler and clamber over the fan blades to get to the base, no mean feat in the dark.

The bell stayed at the top of the chimney all day, no one could prove who had put it up there, but some bright sparks of 53A decided they would get it down. Needless to say they were caught, as much as anything by announcing themselves by letting the bell descend the final few feet courtesy of Isaac Newton (they dropped it). They were punished, not too severely, Frank lived to create mischief another day. Big Mac was re-united with his bell.

Later in the same year, a few days before passing out parade, a sheet appeared where the bell had been bearing the identifier 52B. It was close to passing out parade, the authorities discussed; everyone knew who had put it there (but there was no proof) he was asked to remove it and in broad daylight Frank and Pete ascended again, posing for pictures while sat on the top of the chimney. The pictures didn't come out too well, telephoto lenses weren't common in those days.

'The Incorrigibles' (My description, Ed) from John Bass 44A

We were told, many times, that we were the worst shower-of-a- group Beachley Camp had ever had. The first time of telling coming after only a few day of having been in residence. A later group of Boys recall that they were told the opposite, theirs was the best group and it made them walk tall. The latter statement must have been attributable to mandatory changes in teaching methods over a decade & a half, or so, yet I can believe the statement to be true, even though many of our 44A A Coy lads have proved themselves in Beachley and in later service. The reasons why we could have been as bad as some NCOs said, even in that first six weeks come to mind quickly. We had John F. from Liverpool who refused to join in with making himself smart and presentable and he was frequently caught smoking. The war was on and at "Blackout-board time" he opted out of the proper procedure of standing by the window frame, holding the board. That, and in his manner of his squatting on top of his 'Possessions Personal' locker to take his corner of the board from above, whilst making monkey like noises. Our A/T room Corporal was completely stressed out because "Flannagan" would respond to any of his commands or requests with, "Wherrs me shurt?" Much like 'Old Mother Riley' of that era. It was obvious John F. had no wish to stay when he wheeled a barrow up to 'A Coy' office to collect his 3 shillings pay. He told us, if he could have afforded it, he'd have gone home after the first day. He only stayed to get the travel warrant and that he'd not be coming back after first leave. He did not return, we all thought he'd be shot as a deserter because of the war being on. Then there was Bunny E. who suffered from a grimace that looked like a grin. The number of times he was punished for 'Dumb Insolence' could not be counted and he totalled 360 days jankers in the 3 years spent at Beachley. In the last of his Draft months NCO's refused to charge him knowing that Bunny E. wanted to make it a record: a full year of jankers. Our first year as regulars was served together at St Neots, compared with the numerous conscripts, in our workshops, Bunny E. was all of a skilled artisan, a good comrade and a smart soldier.

After completing my apprenticeship the next stop was Fallingbostel Germany and then to Soltau until I was posted to Aden for a year term. Demobilisation arrived on the 9/1/68 and back to civvy street. A short time was spent in the steelworks on quality control in the pipe mill. Soon I successfully applied for a Government Plant Inspector position in Papua New Guinea & within 3 Months my family and I were out in rural PNG with a 30 mile drive to work across the bush each day; this contract lasted 3 years. A follow on contract saw me working and running an apprentice college combined with teaching courses throughout the Country. I then took the post of Superintendent Transport Co-ordinator for the entire Police transport throughout the country, including 600 hired vehicles, 200 city vehicles, 400 boats & outboard motors with a budget of 3.5 million. Finally the contract came to a end on May 1998 and I returned to UK where I worked as a caretaker for a school until age 65. Then, out of the blue I had a letter from HM Government to say I was to receive a Queens Police Medal in Buck House for my services to Papua New Guinea. So strange things do happen, even to Beachley Boys?

Never a dull moment from the sounds of it! Ed.



Jack Byrne

Jack Byrne, who has died aged 85, was one of the SAS "Originals" and won the Distinguished Conduct Medal for a daring escape from a German PoW camp in 1943. After being recruited by Captain David Stirling, Byrne joined "L" Detachment, 1st Special Service Brigade, the unit which subsequently became 1st SAS Regiment. After intensive training, in November 1941 he took part in a paratrooper raid on enemy fighter bases in the Gazala-Tmimi area, Libya. In the high winds the sticks of the unit became separated, weapons and equipment were lost, and of the 64 men who set out, only 22 returned.

A month later the survivors left their base at the Jalo Oasis for a night raid on the Agedabia airfield. Each man carried eight Lewes bombs, which they placed high up on the wings of the bombers and on the noses of the fighters; they destroyed all 37 aircraft. After helping to blow up ammunition dumps at Berka airstrip, Byrne missed a rendezvous with his patrol. He set off alone across the desert in an attempt to reach the Allied lines and was captured. Told to surrender his arms, he pulled his revolver out from its holster, intending to throw it on the ground. The gesture was misinterpreted and he was shot in the face, but was not badly wounded. Byrne was sent to Stalag Luft III, Sagan, in Poland.

He made two unsuccessful escape attempts before crawling under the perimeter wire directly below a watch tower and walking to Königsberg station. French workmen provided him with civilian clothes, food and money. He then stole a bicycle and made his way to Danzig, evading several road blocks on the way. Having bluffed his way into the docks, Byrne put on a sailor's cap, which he had picked up earlier. When he was challenged by a sentry, he sparred playfully with the man, who then waved him up the companionway and on to a Swedish ship. Byrne concealed himself under one of the boilers, and, when the vessel was searched before sailing, he raised himself off the floor by clinging to a pipe to escape detection. A friendly sailor hid him in the hold and brought him food. After disembarking at Gothenburg, he took the train to Stockholm and flew to Leuchars in a Mosquito. He was awarded the DCM.

A brief full history shows John Vincent Byrne was born on April 1 1921 in Preston, Lancashire, and educated at Army Technical School Chepstow. He enlisted in the Gordon Highlanders and was wounded in France in 1940 while serving with the 1st Battalion. After the evacuation from Dunkirk, he was transferred to the 11 (Scottish) Commando and took part in the landings north of the Litani river during the campaign in Syria against the Vichy French. After his escape from the PoW camp Byrne retained his rank of corporal and moved to the Commando Depot at Achnacarry, Inverness-shire, for rigorous re-training before being posted to 6 Commando. Shortly after landing in Normandy, Byrne was wounded in the knee and evacuated, following recuperation he then rejoined 6 Commando in Holland for the final phase of the campaign in north-west Europe. After the war Byrne was posted

to Greece with 4th Battalion the Royal Norfolk Regiment and was seconded to HQ 179 Infantry Brigade. He was demobilised early in 1947 and served with the Kenya Police for a spell before moving to Kulai Police District Johor on internal security duties, this at the outset of the Malaya Emergency. In 1953 a terrorist fired his revolver into Byrne's stomach at point-blank range. After being discharged from hospital he returned to Kenya working in the prison service prior to retiring in 1958. He settled in Shropshire, and built up a drapery business in 1986. Jack Byrne died on January 10. He married, in 1955 (dissolved), Mary Hayes, who predeceased him; he is survived by their three daughters.
