The New AAC & BOBA Memorial

About this time last year after plans for the closure of the Beachley Barracks, which is still uncertain but will be before 2027 I decided that in order to maintain our links with Beachley and to preserve the heritage of the College thought should be given to relocating the Memorial Stone that was erected adjacent to St Georges Church to a more lasting place which is unlikely to be disposed of within the lifetime of the youngest Apprentice. Accordingly following consultation with the MoD, 1st Battalion Rifles, the Battalion Padre and the CWGC approval was given for this to be carried out.

The obvious location was within the confines of the War Grave Cemetery behind the Old School House and a suitable area was found. Ironically this area overlooked the College Parade Ground, where many a boy endured the wrath of the College RSM and his "considerate" subordinates. Take his name put him in the book and where do you think you are, being just a couple of quotes from those adoring Fathers we had. Not only was it appropriate but it is "outside the wire" and open each and every day without the need to seek permission to wander.

A plan was agreed and just before the last Reunion it came to fruition. A Combat Engineer, Geoff Warren, and a Plant Fitter, Chris Ricketts, both under the command of a retired MPF Dave Clement, accompanied by a Telehandler, loaned for the day by a generous local firm, work commenced. Within a couple of hours with no beer and butties and the odd burst of hilarity the task was completed. The flagpole was erected and a new flag raised for all to see. As many of you know interments of remains has taken place at the former site and a sod of earth from there was taken and placed at the new site as a symbolic gesture to our colleagues.

We already had a request for ashes to be laid and so with all due dignity and respect our Padre, Rev. Joe Rooney accompanied by the Battalion Chaplain rededicated the Memorial and conducted a Service of Interment for Peter Burridge who passed away earlier in 2017.

This is OUR Memorial and any Ex Boy who wishes for some or all of their remains to be placed there it, simply advise next of kin to contact the BOBA Committee. The Memorial will be maintained appropriately and provide us with a resting place forever.

There have already been many visitors to the Memorial and I would suggest a short visit there will bring a little reflection.

A/T Desmond McGregor and Wallasey War Memorial.

In April last year, Bill Morrow 63A posted on the Beachley web site and Face Book a query concerning a grave he had come across in his local cemetery in Wallasey, Cheshire. As part of the Heritage Committee I contacted Bill and offered some help in finding out why an apprentice was listed on the War Memorial and why his grave was in this cemetery. He was also listed as attending the Army Technical School, so he was one of ours!

After some investigation I found that his date of death was 21/12/1940, the time when Desmond McGregor would have been on Christmas leave from the school. On the date mentioned there was a Blitz on Wallasey which, as you can imagine, caused devastation in the local community. More info can be found on the history of Wallasey.co.uk website. A plaque commemorating 325 non -combatant residents can be found on this site.

Interestingly, this also lists the dates of these casualties, and we find the following deaths on the same date:-

McGregor Annie age 48 Widow of C McGregor 37 Serpentine Road 21/12/40

McGregor Eileen age 17 Daughter of above 37 Serpentine Road 21/12/40

McGregor Brian age 14 Son of the above 37 Serpentine Road 21/12/40

This is too much of a coincidence not to be all in the same family.

Strangely enough, on the same War Memorial, the name above Desmond is a Brian McGregor, and when I checked through the Forces War Records site I found him.

He was listed as a civilian, killed on the 21/12/1940, and his recorded age was 14. Place of death, wait for it, 37 Serpentine Road!! His name is also on the memorial to civilians killed in the war in Westminster Abbey. Why his name is on the Forces War Memorial remains a mystery.

Bill Morrow had also done some digging after I had sent him this info. He agreed that Desmond was probably on Christmas leave. His sister Eileen had the same birthday as Desmond and according to birth records was his twin.

At this time there were many raids on Liverpool, all centred around the docks, which was only a mile in a straight line across the river. So as a consequence many "misses" landed in this area of Wallasey resulting in hundred s of casualties.

One last coincidence was that Bill had lived in 10 Serpentine Road when he was younger, just down the road from where number 37 was. The houses are of large Edwardian construction, but where 37 should be is a pair of post war 1950's semis slotted onto the site of the former large 37.

As Bill rightly says, "it's a small world"

After last years Founder's Day Service BOBA members were invited to an Open Day that The Rifles were holding alongside the platform remains of the now long defunct Beachley Railway Station. Here is the report that was published the following week in The Forest of Dean and Wye Valley Review.

Beachley 100 years on

A COMMUNITY event marked the 100th anniversary of the most traumatic episode in the history of Beachley.

On September 14 1917 more than 100 people were evacuated from the peninsula to make way for the construction of a massive shipyard.

The event on Sunday, organised by the Tidenham Historical Group and 1 Rifles, was prompted by the publication of a book by group members Carol and Richard Clammer on the events of September 1917 and the industrial development that followed.

The day included the display of the original Beachley steam locomotives, the launch of Mr and Mrs Clammer's book, buglers and the Fijian community choir of 1 Rifles, displays by local groups including the Severn Area Rescue Association, the Severn Princess Restoration Group and the Chepstow Coastguard. Tidenham Church arranged games for the children





Sales of the book, Beachley and the First World War: The Story of a Shipyard, a Railway and the Transformation of a Rural Parish were brisk.

Mr Clammer said: "The day has been very well supported and we are particularly grateful to Bill Parker of the Flour Mill in Bream for bringing one of the original Beachley engines and to 1 Rifles for their help in making the day possible."

Chairman of the Tidenham Historical Group, Keith Underwood, said Mr and Mrs Clammer had worked "tirelessly and with incredible energy" on the book. He said: "I was brought up with the Apprentices' School, or college as it became, but it was the Army Technical School (Boys) when my father, a Royal Engineer, brought me and my mother here in 1937.

"When, sadly, the army finally leaves Beachley (in 2027), a new era will open and new generations will see the peninsula develop in a new light.

"I hope its history and heritage will not evaporate in an increasingly materialistic age.

"My thanks and those of all the members of Tidenham Historical Group, are due to Carol and Richard Clammer who have worked tirelessly and with incredible energy to ensure the publication of this magnificent book and for the organisation of this event.

"Thanks are also due to Liz McBride, Coral Blandford and other members of the group who helped make the day a success and thanks, too, to the officers, NCOs and men of the Rifles who made the event possible."


New Robots for Old

I first met Billy as a boy in 1955 in Beachley and over the next three years he excelled as a rugby player at the Army Apprentices School. He later graduated into the Royal Engineers in the spring of 1958 and I lost touch with him at that point. I know that he married the love of his life, Kathie around that time and, as he told me later, that was the best thing he ever did. They travelled the world together in and out of the military, finally settling in Australia. Bill was a family man, first, last and foremost and he just adored Kathie and his children. He was just one of those men who liked bringing people together and he had a heart as big as Australia. Almost fifty years after first walking through the gates of

Beachley I received an e-mail from Bill; as did numerous other members of 55A. He had gone on line and tracked us all down by fair means or foul in order to bring us together for our 50th reunion as a group once more.

It was a lot of work, and he scoured the globe, searching all known records and social media outlets, but he did it lovingly knowing the joy it would bring to the rest of us. That was who Billy was, a kind and caring man with a heart of gold and a passion for life. With Kathie beside him no task was too daunting and he inspired many others by simply being Billy. The reunion we had in September 2005 brought tears to our eyes as we said our farewells to our long lost friends', all reunited again thanks to Billy. The world could never have too many Billy Welch's in it. He would brighten the room just by his presence in it. Perhaps that is why the Good Lord chose to take him early. I am quite sure Bill's presence there will brighten their rooms too, just as he did ours down here. It was our loss perhaps but hopefully we shall meet up again, God Willing. God Bless you Billy, it was an honour to have known you and a distinct pleasure having you as my friend. You will always be in our hearts and never ever forgotten. All families should have such a father they can justly be proud of and know in their hearts that he was loved and respected and missed by many others too.

TERRY AIRE 57A GROUP A COMPANY

Following a relatively short illness Terry sadly passed away on 3rd February 2018, this followed several months of treatment for thyroid and lung cancer.

Terry was very proud to be a member of the Beachley Old Boys Association and regularly attended the re-union weekends and fully supported the Army Apprentice National Memorial at the Alrewas Arboretum National Memorial. He attended the opening service ceremony September 2011 and his last visit was the AGM held in May 2017 followed by the Sunday Memorial Service.

Terry served in R.E.M.E as a vehicle mechanic and saw service in Germany at Künsebeck near Bielefeld with frequent trips to Christiansand in Norway.

His civilian career until he retired was at Devon Port dock yard on the maintenance of nuclear submarines, not bad for a R.E.M.E v/m.

He was a keen and talented football player who represented A company and Beachley football teams and was awarded school colours for football. He played for his unit and R.E.M.E. team in Germany. He was a lifelong supporter of Plymouth Argyle football team.

His other claim to fame was photography, always happy to be taking photo's and videos at the re-union weekend and the apprentice memorial site.

Terry was one of a number of 57A group boys who joined Beachley in February 1957 who travelled up from Devon and Cornwall. An amusing incident occurred on one occasion when they were returning to Beachley after a period of leave, a paperboy got on the train at Exeter and proceeded to give the Beachley boys a lot of cheek and aggro, so one of the group kidnapped him and kept him on the train until they reached Severn Tunnel Junction station when they released him. The instigator of this incident shall remain anonymous, no names no pack drill, but he did go on to be a Major.

A lasting memory of Terry was during the inter company boxing event at Beachley, he was selected to box for A company, his 5' 4" frame was up against a 6' blond guy from C company. We thought Terry would be massacred or lose his tongue, which he constantly stuck out in front of his lips, he survived by wearing out his opponent by prancing around the ring until he lost on points.

To his friends, he was considered a typical Cornishman in that for some reason he would always return from leave with the same amount of money that he originally went home with.

I was reminded of when we first arrived at Beachley and paraded to be kitted out, we will never forget Terry standing in front of us with his greatcoat hanging down to his ankles and his sleeves hanging halfway down his legs looking like Dopey in the 7 dwarfs. He looked at us and said with a deadpan face "I want to go home" there was an uproar of laughter, that characterised him for the rest of his career.

There were many more happy moments spent with Terry on the frequent occasions that we met up over the last 58 years, our good friend will be sadly missed and can never be replaced.

Terry was a dedicated family man and leaves behind his wife Dorothy two daughters and his grandchildren.

His good friend Tony Deasey 57A on his last visit to see Terry in hospital was told by Terry " see you in heaven Buddy". We hope so Terry – God Bless

AFRICA'S BEST KEPT SECRET

The title is not mine but a direct steal from the Ethiopian Airways brochure, but I make no apologies for that because it says it all about that wonderful country. Two visits in a year and both to make preparations for the Beschillo and Blue Nile expedition. Many years ago I had taken part in the first expedition to traverse the Blue Nile, or as it is known locally, the Great Abbai. A series of ferocious rapids with crocodiles populating parts of the river. Along the banks were the ever present Shifta armed with their ancient rifles looking for whatever we had.

This time, my second recce, I had with me a slightly stronger team allowing us to separate into two parts so we could cover more ground. In particular there was a need to have a look at the area close to the Sudan border. That was to be the tougher assignment so with my usual sneaky manipulation I sent the other group down there. Well! It's no use being in charge if, just occasionally, you cannot pull rank. Anyway I am incredibly old, or so they kept telling me!

On arrival in Addis Ababa we did the cultural thing and attended an evening of music and dance put on by some very energetic Tigreans. Wonderful show it was too. It was extra special for me in particular as during the evening a very beautiful young lady came over to me and I thought that she asked me to pull the draped curtain toggle to close them. Being an obliging gentleman I reached behind me and tugged on the said toggle only to find that it was a set of bare electric wires. For several seconds I out danced anyone on stage, much to the delight of the ageist rat bags who reckon they are my comrades. Will I ever live it down?

So our happy teams, of Steve Bridle and John Teague, the hard men! on the one hand, and Fiona Pace, Graham Catchpole (Jaws) and I on the other, prepared for our separate, but similar tasks. Checking on the possible supply points along the Beschillo and Blue Nile Rivers.

Feeling somewhat charged up we left town for the north towards Lake Tana, via towns such as Dessie and Tenta to view the country to be covered. One of the aims was to have a look at some community projects such as well digging, provision of school equipment and a visit to a clinic. It was quite amazing to meet very small children who think nothing of walking 16km to get to school or 2 hours to collect the day's water supply for the family. When I say small I am referring to kids no older than 6 years of age! I over heard someone say, "What is the use of doing things here, it's all wasted". "Oh no it is not!" In my travels about the world I have never come across people who work as hard as they do for so little. They deserve our help.

The school at Adbijar was an eye opener. Short of everything, and terribly rundown, but with a dedicated staff who handle classes 60 to 100 strong. The pupils know that if they work hard there may be a chance for them in life. It does take great sacrifices by their families, though, to find the money to buy the reference books and writing materials. The

standard of reading in English was extremely high but the textbooks were invariably tatty. We soon discovered that it was better to hand out pens and pencils than money.

The Ethiopian mountain scenery is awesome, the bird life wonderful and there were the red heart baboons doing their best to help the local farmers with the gathering in of the crops. Both seemed to be content to give way to the other and to live in some sort of harmony. Everyone became totally engrossed in the birds, except me! Oh I like them too but not to the point where I feel the need to rush out, buy an anorak and binoculars so that I look the part. My interests are more towards all things electrical!

The real fun was meeting the children everywhere we stopped to take in a view. In spite of having a very tough life they always had a ready smile and wanted to try out their English on the "Ferengies". Fiona was the best at getting them in line for yet another pen and pencil issue. It reminded me a bit of my army days. One minute they were a bustling, pushy mob and suddenly she would bawl, "Get in line"; and they did! Then she strode down it grandly handing out the goods with that set of the jaw that brooked no arguments. At such times she scared me too. Matronly, is the word that comes to mind!

My biggest moment of the visit came when I met "Tilly" Mekonnen in our hotel in Addis. "Tilly" had been a young naval Lt attached to us during the 68 expedition. He has not changed a bit. Still young looking and fit but now a retired commodore working as a legal advisor to one of the international teams charged with rebuilding the Ethiopian road system. It was a huge thrill hearing of his adventures over the years. Arrested and imprisoned for being in the services in the days of Haile Sellasi. Released, with no explanations, so he crossed into Somalia and went into hiding until a new government came into power. Then eventually he was able to return home to his family.

All too soon we had to return to Addis Ababa for the return flight to London. But "merciful heavens!" there was no queues for checking in, the in flight meals were good and everything was on time. They may have difficulties in Ethiopia but they certainly know how to run an airline.

Awaiting me at home was more of the same. Reed boat trips along the rivers of South America and delivering a grand piano to the Wai Wai Indians of Guyana. A grand piano? Yes! But that's another story.

We had all enjoyed a tremendous experience. I cannot wait to go back. Long may it be said that Ethiopia is "Africa's best kept secret", but let it not be so where helping the people is concerned. They are striving, in the face of truly daunting problems, to make a better future for their children.

Ask yourself "What can I do to help"?



Item 1.Opening:

The Chairman welcomed all members to the AGM and thanked them for making the effort to attend.

Item 2- Welcoming:

The President welcomed all present and hoped they had all enjoyed the previous evening's entertainment at The Beaufort Hotel. He thought the attendance (49) at the AGM today was poor. Item 5 Matters Arising (CR):

There were no matters arising from the minutes.

<u>Item 6 – Executive Committee Report (ST)</u>:

The Chairman stated that he would remain as Interim Chair for the present, with Chris Ricketts being Vice Chair.

The Committee operates on your behalf and has, since the last AGM, reorganized into groups which can operate independently, seeking advice and guidance from the Chair/President as necessary, and informing other committee members as required. This has resulted in the full committee meeting once a year besides the AGM, reducing travel costs and domestic upheaval, utilizing electronic media to carry out their business. We are still awaiting a replacement secretary for Derek Walker, who has now completed 13 years in the appointment. Volunteers please!

Chairman (CR):

He stated that he was pleased that yesterday evening at The Beaufort Hotel, had gone so well, and that we were so fortunate to find a number of 86A group there too. They are now considering joining BOBA. The move there from the camp at Beachley, was for economic reasons. Plenty of tables and chairs were available, and members mingled easily together. Mr. Alf Chracina and Geoff Warren are to be thanked for arranging the function. (a round of applause from the members present).

In reference to the Camp closure, having spoken to HQ Brecon and a Defence Land Sales colleague, apart from the year given by the government, nothing is in the pipeline.

The memorial stone by the church has been moved to inside the local church cemetery, fully in line with regulations and CWGC/CO's agreement. On Sunday there will be a small service to intern Peter Burridge's, ashes, and to sanctify the new location of the memorial. Sod has also been moved to ensure previous internees are reburied here too. Members wishing to have their ashes interred here should enquire initially with the committee.

Members were reminded of the FACE-Book page for the association, and not to abuse its use.

ST Thanked Chris for all the work he had put in on these matters on our behalf.

Treasurer (CR):

In the absence of the new treasurer BH, CR stood in. He stated the GPF breakdown was in this years BE's, and no activity had taken place in the interim, so wished members to support him with a vote of approval for the same. The Current Account stood at £2049.75. Investments of £15K, undertaken by D Chapman and T Waite,

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were reinvested last time and annual interest had been earned, however on 'buy back', the gilts were only worth £13K. The price to repurchase fewer gilt units at 8.5% did not represent good value, especially with the work involved for the Treasurer. Hence the money has been invested in a Monmouthshire Bank Savings account, with an annual interest rate of 8%. So in future there will be no 'gilts interest' shown in the accounts. Membership fees remain unchanged.

A vote confirming the true reflection of the BOBA Fund was taken.

Membership (DF):

15 new members (listed at the rear) have joined since the last reunion. We have at this time 468 paid up members. The membership database now gives a much clearer picture of member's payments. 67 Group's reunion this year has drawn 5 new members to add to the existing 10. The Sympathy and Get well cards have been obtained for distribution as necessary. There is a need to get old boys from many of the later groups of the school to join, as they are the future of the association. It was pleasing to note the 86A ex-boys, whom wished to join! Beachley Echoes (RA):

Thank you for your wishes for a speedy recovery for Gwen. May I thank Ken Reader for handing over such a good Beachley Echoes setup. This year, 81 hard copies were sent out. Printing costs have reduced to £94/100 copies, through a local printer in Wigan, and I have managed to obtain a box of C4 envelopes for £10.55 which is excellent value. Postage overseas remains very costly, up to £5.60, against the UK average cost of £1.27 each. We had considered having a coloured copy of BE's, but the cost would be six times that of Black and White! Also reverting to hard copy for all would prove very expensive too. The Army Technical School Scheme

This article is not the result of new research but an amalgam of the information gathered from a number of sources.

I thought it might be a good thing to remind ourselves why the School was required and how it came to be at Beachley without going into too much detail.

The training of boys for the Army was a well-established practice for example the Royal Artillery were training boys at Woolwich in 1741 and there were other small establishments operating during and after WWI.

Our story began in 1919 when the Army Council decided to set up a War Office Committee to "examine the necessity for, and practicability of, establishing a School for training boys as tradesmen for the Army in order to supply the deficiency consequent upon the impossibility of recruiting tradesmen in sufficient number from civil life." Not surprising that tradesmen were in short supply; vast numbers of skilled men were killed or invalided during the war which also took or injured young men who would have been the apprentices of the day. Add to that the shortage of skilled men to the advancement in mechanisation and other fields and it was obvious that the Army had to take steps to address the situation. The decision to go ahead with a scheme to train their own tradesmen would also have the additional benefit of offering employment to some of the country's youth during difficult times.

The idea was to have 1000 boys at any one time undergoing 3 years training as apprentices followed by 8 years colour service and 4 years with the reserve. After much deliberation sixteen trades were identified but the School started with four i.e. blacksmiths, carpenters and joiners, electricians and fitters.

The staff, numbering 250 which would be a quarter of the strength of apprentices, were to be split into administrative and instructional who were drawn from the Infantry and technical corps respectively.

No 1 Group totalling 105 boys reported to Buller Barracks, Aldershot on 25th September 1923, they were accommodated at No 1Corps Depot RASC. In January 1924 No 2 Group arrived and on 28th February the School (approximately 250 all ranks) left their temporary quarters and moved to Beachley. The newly painted huts were barely dry and there were no workshops, admin offices, gym, Sgts Mess and no roads! Initially there was only one Company, A Coy but with the arrival of No 7 Group in September 1925 B Coy was formed. The School strength was now 860. And so, the School / College continued to thrive until it closed in 1994.

The site originally chosen for the School was at Blandford Forum in Dorset but this was changed to Beachley which already had quite a bit of history attached to it and is the subject of a very interesting book. The site had been requisitioned by the government in 1915 for the construction of the National Shipyard No 2 complete with everything required to build ships, however none were ever built there. The site was also a prisoner of war camp and the government decided to sell of the equipment etcetera; sales were still in progress when the School arrived on the site in 1924.

Much of the School / College history that has been published was gleaned from the 'Robot' magazines produced over the years. The standard of the magazine varied considerably but there was much effort put into the production of the first edition. So much so that the then Secretary of State for War wrote some words to express his interest in the School. Also, for that first edition the great Rudyard Kipling chose one of his poems as his message to the School.

If you want to learn more about the history of the School / College I would recommend that you purchase a copy of Source 1B which is advertised elsewhere in this edition of the Beachley Echoes.

ARMY BEDS I HAVE KNOWN

Reminiscing one day my mind started to dwell on beds, I don't know why, but probably because beds were very important to us and could be associated with times and places during our service. My first Army bed was of course the one at Beachley. Now our beds, at least in my time at the school, were the only thing we had apart from our kit and a locker, that we could call our own. It was that little island in the room that was ours, the only place where we could relax in comfort and where others did not intrude. It was therefore something special. It was both a comfort and a frustration. A comfort as a place of rest and a frustration due to its construction. The spring part of the bed was made up of springs round the edges of the frame, joined across the bed by a series of short (4inches?) metal links, the bed itself being designed in two sections which allowed the foot portion to slide into the head portion, but as the links between the springs had a habit of disconnecting and falling onto the lower section this often prevented it from being pulled out again.

Moving on to Mans Service I met up with the "Board Bed", this consisted of two metal supports, one for each end of the bed, made of 1/2inch rod which was shaped into a horizontal bar with a vertical triangular support at each end. You also had three wooden boards each approximately 10 inches wide which you laid on top of the supports; this gave you a bed about 6 inches off the ground. The only snag was the boards varied quite a lot in strength, some bending much easier than others. If you had one board weaker than the others the problem was where to put it. In the middle it sagged with your weight and you rested on the edges of the other two boards, if you had it on one edge then you really only had the width of the other two boards to sleep on. The only way to solve the problem was to ask if anyone else in the room had the same problem and then swap boards until they nearly all matched each other in strength.

Then I became acquainted with the palliasse, this was a canvas bag shaped like a mattress, but without the shaped side or end panels . You were handed this and directed to a building where there were piles of straw and left to fill the palliasse. There was a technique to this, too much straw resulted in a hard unshapeable Mattress and too little left you with a thin mattress that gave no support at all.

On being posted abroad we had our first experiences with a Hammock. The Troop Ships in my early travels all supplied hammocks for the troops, which we had to sling every night over the mess tables in the troop decks. They were in very close proximity to each other. Not too bad really ,you could get a night's sleep apart from the disturbance of someone getting up to visit the toilet when if he wasn't careful he would have several hammocks rocking when he knocked into them.

When we got to Egypt at times, as we were RASC, the convoy leaguered up at night in the desert where we had to sleep on the sand, this was not too bad as long as you remembered to scoop out a depression for your hip.

There were nights in our early days in Egypt when we had Gippy Tummy and it was impossible to leave the latrines ,which were not situated near the tents .Many of us slept on the latrine seat all night wrapped in a blanket . I don't recommend this.

I only ever slept on one Camp bed, and that was one "borrowed" from a lorry I was travelling in. It was that or the sand, the comfort didn't last long however as I woke up itching all over. The bed was full of Bed Bugs.

There was a period in Palestine where we had good beds in our tents. There were metal fixings on the tent poles which were there for the purpose of securing our weapons at night. Despite this some weapons had still been stolen, so were told to sleep with our weapons in our beds, I had a Thompson Sub Machine Gun and I'm sure I can still see impressions of this on my body.

When you were really tired you could sleep anywhere ,and one of our favourite beds when I was with a Tank Regiment was to lay a tarpaulin on the ground ,lay on it, and then pull the rest of the tarpaulin over you to keep out any rain. Only one main point here, you always had to lay on a slope to let any water run off the cover and away from you

Then there was the "DDT bed. This could apply to any bed that you had in a Malaria infected country. You were given a DDT Bomb and after getting into bed you tucked in the Mosquito net under the mattress and then broke the seal on the bomb releasing the DDT into the area under the net. This killed any Mosquito's and you were able to lie down to sleep and breath in all the DDT.

Then there were beds on Trains. On the Mombassa to Nairobi railway we travelled First Class, four to a compartment .In the evening an attendant came and raised the back rest of each seat and turned it and the seat itself into beds, very comfortable. A much more uncomfortable Train bed was on the MEDLOC route across France to the Mediterranean .There we were 6 to a compartment and we slept two on the floor, two on the seats, and two in the luggage racks, we decided on our positions by tossing a coin.

One last memory. On the Kenya-Mombassa-Nairobi Trains, there was a card listing the names of the occupants on the outside of each compartment, so that you knew where to go. At the time my companion and I were both Mechanist Staff Sergeants (M.S.S.) in the RASC .We entered our compartment only to be told by two RAF types already there , that we were in the wrong compartment as there were two women joining them there, yes they had mistaken (M.S.S.) on the card for (Miss).

Looking back to the 40's, 50's, 60's & 70's

Looking back, in comparison to modern times, it's hard to believe that we have lived as long as we have. When we were children, we would ride in cars, if we had one, with no seat belts or air bags. Riding in the back of a lorry on a warm day was always a really exciting treat for those who had the opportunity.

Our baby cots were covered with lead-based paint. Childproof lids on medicine bottles, doors, or cabinets did not exist. When we rode our bikes, we had no helmets. We drank water from the garden hose and not from a sterile bottle. Not to mention hitch hiking four miles to the local cinema as a young kid!

We would spend hours building go-carts out of scraps and then rode it down the steepest hill; only to find out we forgot to include any brakes in the design of our master pieces. After running into the bushes a few times we learned to solve the problem without too much of a 'to do'!

No one was able to reach us all day, no cell phones! We would leave home in the morning and play all day, as long as we were back before the streetlights came on, unthinkable today! We played cricket and sometimes the ball really hurt. We got cuts and broke bones and some of us broke teeth, yet there were no law suits from these accidents! They were just accidents; no one was to blame but us. Remember accidents?

We had fights and punched each other and got black and blue but learned to get over it. We ate windfall fruit, grubs and all, and we all drank lemonade, sharing our drinks with our friends, from one bottle and to my knowledge no one died from germs! We were never overweight, we were always outside in the fresh air playing and expending our energy. We did not have PlayStations, Nintendo 64, X-Boxes, video games, nor 99 channels on cable TV, video tape movies, surround sound, personal cell phones, personal computers, internet chat rooms, we had lots of friends and we just went to school, or out socially to find them.

If Dad was a bit better off than most, we rode a bike. If not we walked to a friend's home and knocked on the door, or rung the bell if you were posh, or just walked in and talked to them. Imagine such a thing!!! Without asking parents, by ourselves, out there, in the cold cruel world, without a guardian!!! How did we do it?

We made up games with sticks and tennis balls and bit and bobs, although we were told it would happen, we did not put any eyes out, nor did the worms inside eaten grubby fruit live inside us forever.

The Children's sports leagues had tryouts and not everyone made the school teams, those who didn't had to learn to deal with disappointment. Some school kids weren't as smart as others so they failed an exam and maybe didn't make grammar, or technical school; these exam tests were not adjusted for any reason. Some of us lucky lads, who didn't fare so well at school, managed to catch up later at Beachley!

Our actions were of our own making, consequences were expected if we were caught stepping out of line, we could not hide from our wrongs; in majority there was no one to hide behind. The idea of a parent bailing us out if we broke a law was ludicrous and unheard of! They actually sided with the law; just imagine that!

These generations have produced some of the best risk-takers and problem solvers and inventors ever. The past 50 years has been an explosion of innovation and new ideas. We had freedom, success, some failure, and responsibility and we learned how to deal with it all! Well almost!!!

Please pass this on to others who may have had the luck to grow up as kids, before governments regulated our lives, lost all form of discipline, and made the young one's grow up way before their childhood could be lived.

I still profess those who were born and brought up during the war years and post to them had the best young times and by and large we were very happy. Even in civilian life most of us didn't have much in the way of material possessions, but we did have integrity, honesty and true friendships and we cared about our fellow man, the community spirit of what we could do for others, rather than what could get out of a situation!

Editor's Note: This was sent in to Mac, an earlier Editor, by an ex Beachley Boy. Unfortunately there is no reference to who it was. The words are true and show how much more difficult and stressful life has become. Stay safe out there.

From Somebody At A Higher Level Than Us Boys.

I started my time at Beachley on 1st June 1970., Alf Jeffs was the HIO for the plumbers, blacksmiths, and welders. In 1973 as chairman I asked and obtained permission to get the department to build a slide for the Woodcroft Playing Field Association which was on display when Princess Ann visited the college.

1981 and 1982 I attended two summer camps where my "job" was to take any of the apprentices who could play to various golf courses. The first camp was on the Isle Of Man and the second was to Penally, West Wales. Robin Thomas another instructor also came on these camps, his "job" was to instruct on surf boarding. One incident was that one of the PTI sergeants insisted that he was going to "have a go" at surfboarding never having done it before, he was a "natural" and took off very well. Unfortunately he had no idea how to change direction but luckily was later rescued by a passing vessel part way across the Bristol channel.

In 1983 Terry (Dolly) Grey another plumbing instructor and I took a group of Apprentices to St Kilda on the HMAV Ardennes to do various plumbing jobs as required. A wonderful experience.

The next year, a welding instructor and I took another group of lads for more maintenance work, this time on the HMAV Aracans.

In 1985 the college undertook to restore and convert the old farm house on Flat Holmes Island and convert it into a study centre, once again I was lucky enough to take my group to do much of the plumbing.

Apart from the time that our particular building was closed down due to asbestos contamination life was quiet for most of the time mainly because we all knew that the place was closing down and we were moving to Chatham.

I'm sorry that I didn't keep records of the lads I instructed except for the intake of 1990. They were McKormick, Miller, Mabey, Larner, Metcalf, Foster and Blackburn.

In early 1990 or there about I went twice to Dent where an army unit had an outward bound facility. Our job was to install a new toilet in pink for the convenience of Princess Ann (this girl got around). My fellow instructor was a sergeant whose name escapes me. The second visit was with an Alan Collinson to do some maintenance work.

Whilst there we were invited to try a bit of potholing which we did. A fortnight or so later a group of school children were trapped in the same pothole for some time due to rising water covering the entrance. It made the national headlines at the time.

Well so much for my recollections of my time at Beachley.

SECOND CHANCE FOR A BEACHLEY BOY

While most Beachley Boys, having left Boys Service, have gone on to develop successful careers and in many cases, distinguishing themselves in their particular fields of expertise, there are a handful who, through adverse circumstances, have fallen on hard times and needed help and support to recover and make a positive return to life.

One such soul is Keith Bailey whose case I happened to come across late in 2017, through my local REA Branch, involving Keith with a local **Veterans** support project in Taunton, Somerset.



A local Public House in the town had been empty for some time, and it had come to the notice of our REA Branch Secretary, who with local contacts and support, raised the idea for a Veterans Centre to help rehabilitate a number of Homeless Veterans in the local area.

The notion developed into a project with **Taunton Association for the Homeless** (TAH) who were faced with helping those veterans needing help and accommodation.

With significant support from local organisations including the Royal British Legion and others, sufficient funding was raised to refurbish the property to form a hostel with 8 self-contained

accommodation units, two of which are specifically for disabled veterans.

In conjunction with a West Country based Renovation Company formed by another Ex Sapper, the disused public house was completely refurbished and opened in February 2018.

The Opening Ceremony was conducted by Lt Col Paul Maynard, the CO of 40 Commando RM. The Mayor of Taunton Deane District Council and other notable guests were also in attendance. My Wife and I were fortunate enough to be invited along with local Military residents, as between us we had raised a donation for the project from our local Dance Club.

After the official opening, , we were all invited to inspect the facilities of the new venture, and meet Keith, who had had the

privilege of being the first veteran to move into the property a week before, and had settle into his new home there.

During a brief conversation with Keith, he revealed that, a) he was an ex Sapper, and b) had undertaken his Boys Service in the last Group to Pass Out at Beachley, in 1994, having initially enlisted in the RE Junior Leaders Squadron which had by that time been absorbed into the Beachley Training facility following closure of its former Dover Base.666+

After undertaking his Junior Leader training and leaving Beachley, Keith completed his Sapper (Combat Engineer) Training at 3TRRE at Farnborough before joining 38 Engineer Regiment based at Ripon in North Yorkshire. He undertook RE Driver Training at a nearby base and returned to Ripon, Shortly thereafter he suffered a traumatic event which significantly affected his whole outlook on life. Despite some supposed remedial actions, which did little to help him recover at the time, he eventually left the Army and tried to make a new life.

However, significant depression had set in by this time and he found it difficult to re-adjust to relationships and to civilian life. He had numerous jobs, but these did not always help with his situation.

After spiralling further and further down into depression, and basically suffering a breakdown, his situation was eventually

diagnosed as PTSD and from there on, he was suitably counselled and offered positive help.

His case was referred to TAH, who, with the renovation project well in progress, were in a position to support Keith by providing protective temporary accommodation and help him get his life back on track.

Keith, now 42 years of age, is settling down in his new home, and is currently undertaking voluntary work to repay in some small way, the help he has received from TAH. which hopefully in time will expand into full time employment.

His confidence is growing slowly, he has fully accepted his situation and is optimistic, although still suffering from flashbacks, but with the current support, (he has a dedicated Case Worker), the future looks considerably brighter. Since the venue opening in February, a further 4 veterans have been able to take up residence in the Centre, which is aimed as an interim stepping stone in their return to an active role within the community. Keith has indicated an interested in joining our local REA branch and BOBA in due course and I will be assisting him in achieving those small goals.







